Nature Center Rental Policy

Over the past 6 months we have had questions about renting of the Lake Iowa Nature Center for graduations, weddings, class reunions, birthday parties and more. Well the answer to those questions is yes this facility is open to rent for those special events.

The Lake Iowa Nature Center (LINC) is located at 2550 G Ave, Ladora, IA 52251; telephone is 319-655-8465. The Lake Iowa Nature Center is designed with two floors: Main floor approx. 960 Sq. ft. Great room and wildlife observation area with a comfortable meeting room, library and ADA restrooms facilities. A lower level is 960 Sq. ft. with a classroom at one end, ADA restrooms, a kitchen and is also a storm shelter for severe weather. There is a circular patio area out the back doors.

The primary purpose of the LINC is to provide storm shelter for severe weather, multipurpose rooms for educational/environmental interpretation activities, storage for materials and supplies, exhibits/displays associated with the conservation programs, and office space for the Conservation Board staff.

Secondary purpose for this building is for use by other entities, groups, and events sponsored and conducted by Iowa County Conservation Board, followed by public and private rental of the facility. The public rental fees for choice of floor are as follows:

Payment and deposit are due within two weeks of booking the reservation. A reservation agreement will be signed and the rental policy will be provided to the renter at this time.

Clean up must be performed immediately after the rental and the facility must be returned to the condition it was accepted in. The renter is responsible for clean up and trash removal. Renter is responsible for the cost of removal of carpet stains, scratches in woodwork, marks on walls, etc. left during their rental. 10 Tips for GREEN Camping this Summer

In case you haven't heard, green is in. So while you go 'back to nature' camping this summer, try going green as well! These 10 tips will help you enjoy AND protect our natural environment.

1 - Dump the Disposables

Avoid relying on paper plates and plastic cups and utensils. Instead, buy a set of unbreakable dishes, cups, and utensils.

#2 - Be Water Aware

Take shorter showers and turn the water off while brushing your teeth. Dispose of waste water properly.

#3 - Use Safe Soap

Use biodegradable soap to wash you and your dishes. Always wash at least 200ft from a water source and NEVER use soap to bathe yourself in a body of water.

#4 - Say Farewell to Food Packaging

Minimize food packaging waste by buying in bulk. Plan out your meals and store ingredients in reusable containers. Avoid foods in single serving packages.

#5 - Buy Used Gear

Only camp a few times a year? Try finding used gear- you'll save waste and money.

#6 - Tote Your Trash

Don't litter- dispose of waste you do have according to campground rules. Keep your campsite clean to avoid attracting any unwanted wildlife.

#7 - RECYCLE

Be aware of campground recycling rules and use bins if provided. Sort out recyclable materials from trash.

#8 - Recharge Your Flashlights

Buy rechargeable batteries instead of using disposables. Consider purchasing energy efficient LED flashlights and lanterns.

#9 - Get Off the OFF

Try organic bug spray that is less toxic to you and the environment. Burn citronella candles near your campsite. Wear long pants and sleeves during peak bug hours.

#10 - Eco-Friendly Fishing

Use all lead free fishing equipment. Dispose of any broken line or tackle appropriately- don't litter. Only clean fish at provided cleaning stations.
