Prairie Creek Recreation Area awarded \$750,000

The City of Maquoketa, in partnership with Jackson County Conservation, applied for funding through Destination Iowa to enhance outdoor recreation opportunities at Prairie Creek Recreation Area and improve water quality of Prairie Creek.

Destination Iowa is a \$100 million investment to bolster the quality of life in Iowa's communities and attract visitors and new residents to the state. The new effort will provide grants to help communities move forward on transformational, shovel-ready attractions. Funding is being made available through the federal American Rescue Plan Act.

Projects for Prairie Creek Recreation Area that were included in the grant application include:

- Water quality projects: bank protection, rock weirs, boulder clusters, j-hooks, wetland grading, and bank grading along Prairie Creek in the park to help slow sediment and water flow
- Trail connection from City of Maquoketa along Highway 64 to 223rd Ave portion of Prairie Creek Recreation Area
- Picnic shelter and pit toilets in the NE corner of the park
- Disc golf course
- Tent camping
- Improved fishing along creek

The grant requires projects to be completed by June 2026.



Spruce Creek Park and South Sabula Lake Park are open through November 1st for camping. Water will be on and restrooms open through Monday, October 17 (weather pending).

Save our Streams Field Training **Open to the Public**

Sat. Oct. 8 at 9:30 AM, Felderman Park, Bellevue Sun. Oct. 9 at 1:00 PM, Prairie Creek, Maquoketa

Save Our Streams is a fun way to test water quality by collecting and identifying underwater critters called aquatic macroinvertebrates. Volunteers across the country monitor the health of their local creeks and streams to educate the public and provide data to partners, agencies, and organizations. The Izaak Walton League is partnering with Jackson County Conservation to provide a certification workshop for anyone interested in becoming a monitor.

Becoming a Save our Streams monitor starts with a few online webinars to explain the program and really give you a feel for what the job of a citizen scientist is with this program.



After watching the webinars, contact Jackson County Conservation to sign up for a field session (Oct 8 or 9). Only one session is necessary so pick the day and location that works for you, the event will last under 4 hours. Please be sure to dress to get wet! Waders are encouraged.

Save our Streams takes up where IOWATER left off by training the public in how to conduct water quality surveys in their local areas. The protocols for the chemical and invertebrate sampling are relatively simple to do with two people and can be done in about an hour. Folks are encouraged to collect invertebrate data twice a year and chemical data monthly. The equipment and supplies for sampling are available to borrow from the Hurstville Center and the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium or folks have the option of purchasing their own.

The data from IOWATER and Save our Streams has been included in a nationwide water quality database available at <u>www.cleanwaterhub.org</u>. Monitors are urged to share their data to add to our public understanding of water quality issues and aid scientists in collecting a wider range of data.

FJCC Project Highlights

Hurstville Center East Ramp

A project in the works for this fiscal year is an east ramp at the Hurstville Interpretive Center. An east ramp was in the original plans for the building but because of budget restraints at the time was not completed. The idea is that the west ramp from the parking lot welcomes people into the Center. An east ramp would then welcome visitors to extend their visit outdoors exploring the trails and amenities. And now that the multi-use trail from Maquoketa is in the works and a new solar kiosk was built, an east ramp would help connect the trail system on that side of the Center.

Maquoketa River Water Trail—Bridgeport Access

Throughout 2020 and 2021, Jackson County Conservation worked with the Iowa DNR and other local stakeholders in completing "The Jackson County Water Trail Plan". This plan will provide us and the community a guide for future decision making. The plan establishes a vision for the future of the Maquoketa River and the North Fork and identifies a set of actions to be taken to realize this vision. Throughout the planning process, the Project Steering Committee collected input form stakeholders, river users, and the general public. Using all the information they had collected; the Project Steering Committee developed a list of improvement projects for Jackson County's water trails. The top priority is improving Bridgeport Access for river users. Jackson County Conservation has submitted a grant request for \$75,000 for the Iowa DNR Water Trails Program to install a paved boat ramp at Bridgeport. The grant requires a 25% match (\$18,750).

Friends is committed to helping Jackson County Conservation move projects forward. Both projects are priorities for FJCC this fiscal year. **FJCC has an amazing community of donors or supporters**—and we are calling on that community to help us with these projects. Jackson County Building Better Birders Final Report

Throughout 2020 and 2021, Jackson County Conservation participated in and helped put on four Building Better Birders workshops. Building Better Birders Citizen Scientist workshops are a collaborative project administered by Kelly McKay of Kelly J. McKay of BioEco Research and Monitoring Center, Mark A. Roberts of Clinton County Conservation Board, Brian P. Ritter and James M. Wiebler of Nahant Marsh Education Center and County Conservation Boards. Major funding for this program was provided by the Resource Enhancement And Protection – Conservation Education Program (REAP-CEP).

Building Better Birders Citizen Science workshops are aimed to engage the public with birding and bird identification skills. These workshops were a combination of educational presentations and in the field birding sessions performed by renowned ornithologist Kelly McKay. Jackson County Conservation held 4 "Building Better Birders and Citizen Scientists Workshops" in 2020-2021 (17 September 2020; 2 November 2020; 24 April 2021; and 25 June 2021). Overall, the programming during these workshops included: 5 bird identification presentations and 5 bird hikes. The workshops provided 31.75 total hours of programming, producing an average of 7.9 hours of programs per workshop. During these workshops, 25 total individuals participated (i.e., actual number of people attending a workshop), with 54 cumulative participants (i.e., total number of people attending the various sessions during each workshop). Since all data collected during bird hikes were included in seasonal avian reports to the Iowa Ornithologists' Union, all participants on these workshop sessions were contributing as citizen scientists. During these 4 workshops, Jackson County produced 25 citizen scientists.

A total of 127 species of birds were recorded during these workshops (#2 ranking among all counties). For a complete list of birds identified during the workshops, contact Tony at <u>tvorwald@jacksoncounty.iowa.gov</u>.
