Annett Nature Center Park



The Annett Nature Center Park (ANCP) is 160 acres, includes a six-acre pond and a ten-acre wetland, and lies adjacent to Lake Ahquabi State Park. The Annett Nature Center opened on Earth Day 1997, the result of years of planning by the Warren County Conservation Board (WCCB) and the foresight and benevolence of Warren County citizens such as Ellis Annett. The nature center has three levels containing interpretive exhibits, classrooms, staff offices and a community room that is available for reservation. Proceeds from the sale of the Warren County Farm and Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP) funds also helped to create the ANCP.

The park serves as the hub for WCCB activities, acting as the focal point for many school field trips, public programs and the WCCB Day Camps. Prairie grasses and forbs, a wildlife viewing blind, an observation tower and a butterfly garden featuring sculptures and native flowers are among the attractions. WCCB maintenance and operations are also based here.

The Annett Nature Center is filled with activity year round. WCCB staff offer many environmental education programs and presentations. The ANC



has information, interactive displays and a small collection of local species of live animals. You can visit the Annett Nature Center by appointment or during open hours. The ANC is open noon to 4 p.m. Sunday and 8 a.m. to 4:30

p.m. Monday through Friday. (Duties may require all staff to be away from the building on weekdays so please remember to call ahead.) WCCB naturalists also provide educational programs in Warren County parks and schools. Staff works in classrooms with students and teachers to provide environmental experiences and information about local species and ecotypes. The WCCB education staff also provides programs for specialty groups such as civic organizations and scouts. WCCB naturalists work with every age group — pre-school to senior citizens.

Many outdoor environmental education events are sponsored by the WCCB. Several of the events are annual programs — Kids' Fish Day, Owl Prowl and Bug Day are only a few of the favorite fun and educational events. Seasonal public programs include spring wildflower walks, cross-country skiing and bird migration observations. An excellent day camp



Great Western Trail

The Warren and Polk County Conservation Boards manage this 16.5-mile asphalt trail jointly. Trailheads are located across from the Izaak Walton League Clubhouse on Valley Drive in Des Moines, at Inwood Street in Martensdale and on county road G14 in Cumming. Your trip along the Great Western Trail is a journey into history. It will take you through the site of Lida, past the munitions train derailment and fire near North River and across the Churchville Prairie.

Summerset Trail

Stretching 11 miles from Carlisle to Indianola, the Summerset Trail passes through rolling hills and river bottom wetland as it winds from town to town. Near the midpoint of the trail sits the village of Summerset on the south bank of the Middle River. Restroom facilities with running water are available at the Indianola trailhead and pit toilets are available at the Carlisle trailhead and at Banner Lakes at Summerset State Park near the halfway mark. Parking is available at all three points.

educational opportunities to park visitors. The 80-acre park was acquired by the WCCB in 1976, the board's first land purchase.

Established by the Iowa Department of Transportation as a wetland mitigation site, Blue Flag adjoins the Great Western Trail. The area emphasizes constructed wetlands in the lowlands and reestablished prairie on the associated uplands.

A small bottomland wood on the North River, Wilson Woods is a protected green space for Warren County, but has no public access.

Woodland Mounds Preserve

Before European settlers came to this area, Native Americans lived along the rivers of Warren County. They were part of a culture of people who dwelled in villages located along most of the major watercourses in Iowa and the eastern half of North America. They did not leave a written record, instead they left a variety of their cultural objects such as stone tools, pottery and earthen mounds that help show us how they lived. Evidence indicates that these people lived successfully in this area for thousands of years.

Purchased with a grant from the Wildlife Habitat Stamp Fund, Woodland Mounds Preserve contains 185 acres of timber that provides habitat for many types of woodland wildlife, including many neotropical migrant birds such as warblers. An additional 140 acres are leased for public access.

Zo-El Annett Woods

In 1983 Ellis Annett donated this10-acre woodland to the Warren County Conservation Board as a memorial to his late wife Zona and also in memory of his mother. Zo-El features a winding trail that climbs to the back of the park, crosses a long suspension bridge and then descends back to the trail head, affording the hiker a beautiful stroll through a lovely woodland park along with a picnic ground.

Lundy Acres

A lowland wood near Middle River, Lundy includes a short, pleasant trail and a picnic area.

Rolling **Thunder Prairie**



Rolling Thunder Prairie is a 282-acre wildlife management area with a landscape dominated by native prairie. The preserve was purchased with assistance from Pheasants Forever and the Wildlife Habitat Stamp Fund, a competitive grant program financed by a fee included in Iowa hunting licenses.

A hilly area with a wooded creek, Rolling Thunder consists mainly of grasses and forbs. It is used extensively by a variety of upland, woodland and edge species. The western 200 acres have never been plowed and contain high quality prairie plant species.


