Hurstville Center Awarded the Future Focus Award

When the Hurstville Interpretive Center was christened 20 years ago, there was an ambitious vision to create a world-class nature center that modeled its mission for conservation of natural resources. With this mission and vision, the Staff, and Board of Jackson County Conservation, in partnership with their group of Friends, sought to develop a facility with zero waste and zero carbon emissions. The Center has nearly achieved that challenging goal following the installation of a solar array that generates 100% of the energy used by the Center. During the Center's construction, a geothermal system was installed to maximize energy efficiency in the heating and air

conditioning of the Center. The Center's construction also included a high-quality septic system that returns used water to the aquifer, thus ensuring no waste or run-off from water systems.

The Center hosts events for the public, and for many of these programs, food and beverages are served. For these events, glassware and silverware is used to avoid the use of single use disposable plastic and Styrofoam.

Jackson County Conservation's programming is fully aligned with the concepts of conservation and sustainability. Whether it be a summer camp for youth to learn about conserving nature's beauty and bounty, or boots on the ground restoring our county's prairies and wetlands, the remarkable staff of the Hurstville Center consistently supports conservation.

Let's congratulate the Jackson County Conservation team for their fine work, which has earned them the 2024 Future Focus Award from the Maquoketa Area Chamber of Commerce.


Hurstville Exhibit Makeover

At Home Compost Bins for Sale

Friends of Jackson County Conservation is selling high quality backyard compost bins to encourage residents to reduce waste and build healthy soils. Purchase a compost bin and learn about common composting practices. These home composters are made from 100% recycled material and hold 125 gallons for maximum composting potential, and keeping organic materials out of landfills. Pre-order your bin online while supplies last at Jacksonceb.com, click on news.



What is composting? Composting is taking things such as food scraps and yard waste and letting it go through the natural process of decomposition to create nutrient rich soil amendments. It is another form of recycling that is natural, and helps revive your soil with important nutrients. Compost can be used as mulch, mixed into the soil of potted plants, spread around on lawns, raked into flower and tree beds, and used in vegetable gardens. Anyplace you want to give your plants (and soil) some extra love is a great place to mix in compost!

Why should I compost? Composting helps reduce the amount of organic waste that ends up in our landfills, reduces the use of pesticides and fertilizers, conserves water, improves soil quality, reduces greenhouse gas emissions, and so much more.

<u>How do I compost</u>? It's simple! Combine Carbon– rich materials ("browns"- dry leaves, plant stalks, shredded paper, cardboard (no coatings), untreated woodchips), Nitrogen-rich materials ("greens"- fruit and vegetable scraps, grass clippings, eggshells, paper tea bags (no staples), coffee grounds), moisture, and oxygen! Let your compost pile do most of the work! Occasionally add new materials and stir it around to start creating your very own compost at home!
