In the beginning—the Friends of Webster County Conservation

On a September evening in 2004, a group of concerned citizens gathered in the Bob Heun Shelter at Kennedy Park to discuss the future of conservation and recreation in Webster County. During the discussion a vision emerged – a local investment in the natural resources of Webster County is essential for providing environmental stewardship and recreational opportunities for future generations.

The product of this meeting was a (501c3) non-profit organization known as the "Friends of Webster County Conservation". The mission of the group is to provide awareness, appreciation, and the preservation of Webster County's natural resources for future generations.

The mission will be accomplished by: 1.) Encouraging the citizens of Webster County to be good stewards of the land, 2.) Providing educational programming that allows people to interact with the natural environment, and 3.) Creating an opportunity for local citizens to actively participate in the decision-making process for conservation and recreation issues in Webster County.

Funds will be used to improve facilities, provide equipment, and assist with programming for environmental education in Webster County




- Funds are invested and managed by the Fort Dodge Community Foundation




